Project Initiation: A project inception workshop was held in Donkorkrom, the centre of the project area, between 24-29 April 2023. This provided an opportunity to review project plans and objectives with the participating organisations, but also brief local officials and elders about the project. There was overwhelming support, which has been evidenced by the high level of participation in project activities across the project area.

Implementation: The project is on track with targets for the first 6 months with 95% of planned activities being actioned. Frequent communication and information exchange with project partners and regular project management meetings have been useful tools for keeping on track, for being able to identify issues early on and for identifying mitigating action.

An adjustment to the training approach was adopted. It was decided that it would be beneficial to condense the delivery of the training workshops to the second and fourth quarter of the year, rather than spread evenly throughout. The reason for this came from the training team who felt it would be positive for trainees if the training followed as soon after the introduction of the project to each individual community. Participation of women has been very encouraging with 380 of the 843 people trained to date being women.

Progress against Outputs:

Output 1: Beekeeping training workshops delivered across 17 communities. Interest is high with attendance higher than anticipated in many communities. Expressions of interest from unanticipated groups such as Persons With Disability (PWD) have been received. This is highly encouraging, but will require adaptation on the part of the training team. BfD will link team with BfD funded projects in Uganda to learn from their PWD specific approach. We have adapted training to be more convenient for women to attend. Through feedback we learned that the timing of training events did not fit with their other demands. Delivery timing has been adjusted to be more sympathetic to this requirement.

Post-training mentoring and support is now ongoing for the groups which have been trained. Early evidence of hive making and apiary establishment is encouraging, notwithstanding the unusually high rainfall experienced in the area which has severely affected mobility and access to forest areas.

Output 2: Construction work on the processing facility has progressed well. The unseasonably high rainfall has had an impact with some time being lost. Work was 70% complete at the end of the reporting period. We are confident that the facility will be ready for the start of the honey harvest. Expected to be early November.

Output 3: Fire management training started in October (outside the reporting period). Ghana National Fire Service is delivering the training together with BfD Ghana. Community awareness meetings have been held with 15 communities scheduled to receive training during October. There is a real enthusiasm at community level for this training indicating that the threat of fire is very real for communities.

Output 4: Survey of beekeepers' tree planting priorities was conducted in 21 communities. Priority tree species have been selected and are being raised for distribution to the beekeepers once their apiaries have been established. Phase 1 of the Plant Species Population and Diversity Baseline Study (forest inventory) took place in the reporting period to define the survey sites (10) and the method. The detailed survey will be conducted in November.

Output 5: Identified and constructively engaging charcoal producers to participate in the project with 200 being invited to join the beekeeping training. The traditional authorities and other opinion leaders have been engaged and are playing an active role in raising awareness of the benefits of honey production over charcoal production.

Output 6: Project news and progress is being published through BfD Ghana website, with three articles on the project being published during the reporting period. Several activity and progress posts – made up of photos, videos and texts – have been shared across BfD and BfDG social media channels.

Unusually heavy rainfall: Heavier than usual rainfall during the reporting period has impacted project activities, in particular training events. In favourable circumstances, training takes place outdoors to allow for practical demonstrations and participant practice. When it rains indoor venues, usually churches, needed to be identified and used – and this is not always possible. The rain has also discouraged trainees from making their first hives as access to sites to harvest hive-making materials has been problematic. Once the rains ease, participants have confirmed they will start making more hives and establishing their apiaries. Whilst this has had an impact on the number of hives we had anticipated by this time, we do not believe it will negatively impact outputs. Indeed, we are encouraged by the number of hives being made under these adverse conditions

Access to communities: The heavy rain has made an already poor road system far more challenging for vehicle access. On the premise that beekeeping is a viable livelihood for people living remotely with poor access to markets for their produce (if kept well, honey does not have a shelf life) we have actively chosen some communities which are remote and harder to reach. As a consequence, we have not been able to deliver training to 3 communities as had been planned in the first 6 months. We will deliver the training as soon as conditions allow in the next quarter and do not anticipate a negative impact on the project.

We had anticipated that radio broadcasts about the project, the livelihood and biodiversity benefits of beekeeping, advice and panel/chat shows would have started in quarter 2. Unfortunately, the project partner APDO (Afram Plain Development Organisation) who deliver the service, encountered technical problems with their broadcasting equipment and this delayed the schedule. Replacement parts have been found and we fully expect the broadcasts to begin early in quarter 3. We do not anticipate this will affect outputs and it does not affect the budget.
