1. Outline progress over the last 6 months (April – Sept) against the agreed project implementation timetable (if your project has started less than 6 months ago, please report on the period since start up to end September).

The project has kept to the implementation timetable in all respects during the first six months, with activities programmed for this period completed or underway as planned.

The analysis of the pilot conservation agreements scheme which conserves Livingstone's flying fox roost sites (Output 1) was led by Dr Edwin Pynegar (Bangor) with the support of Dahari staff. Interviews were organised with all seven beneficiaries of the pilot scheme with the goal of evaluating their understanding of the program as well as its costs and benefits to them. Interviews were also undertaken with five members of Dahari staff closely associated with the scheme (two scheme designers and three implementers), as well as a representative from the partner Bat Conservation International.

Key findings are that six out of seven beneficiaries had a clear understanding of the scheme's functioning and objectives. All beneficiaries claim to have respected the conditions of the program and land use intensity was consistently reported as reduced in conserved parcels which contain the roost sites. One respondent was entirely positive about the program, stating that he would not change any aspects of it and that he would like to see the agreements' duration extended to ten years, and several respondents stated that they benefited from the materials and training provided by Dahari as well as the per diems provided when researchers visit. Many reported that their neighbours were jealous that they were participating in the scheme.

However, while the scheme represents additional conservation, it also represented a significant cost for most of the participants. Six out of the seven felt that they had found themselves at least somewhat disadvantaged by not being able to farm in conserved areas, which was particularly costly to those with relatively small areas of land. The participants provided a number of suggestions as to how the scheme could be modified. A report is available.

A legal consultant, Dr Said Mahamoudou, with a PhD and further experience in Comorian land tenure assessments was recruited from the faculty of law at the University of the Comoros to

lead the land tenure review (Activity 2.3). The terms of reference are under development for work to start in November.

Mapping layers and data were collated to support identification of priority areas for rollout (Activity 2.4). Further data collection was undertaken regarding water sources and rivers to support development of a water prioritisation layer, as well as recalculation of river and stream locations and catchment boundaries derived from a fine-scale digital elevation model.

A student from the University of Copenhagen was recruited under the supervision of Prof Jonas Geldmann to support development of the rollout plan (Activity 2.5) and the impact assessment for the scheme.

Dahari are in the final stages of a process with a foundation to secure significant funding that would underpin the scheme until the end of 2025 (Activity 3.5).

One member of Dahari staff was trained in semi-structured interviewing as part of the assessment of the pilot scheme, and the whole Dahari team have been trained in conservation agreements approach through two workshops (Activity 5.1). Wider training needs for the delivery of the project are currently being assessed.

A University of the Comoros student is undertaking a study with Dahari and the support of Bat Conservation International on GPS tagging of Livingstone's flying fox (Activity 5.2). The results of this work will identify key feeding sites to be fed into prioritisation of areas to integrate into the conservation agreements scheme.

Prof Julia Jones (Bangor) and Prof Owen Lewis (Oxford) will be in the Comoros on a first supervision mission from October 24th to November 1st to ensure that everything is well prepared for the second half of the year.
