

As a response to the Covid-19 pandemic, the government of Cambodia blocked all non-essential international travel. Approximately a third of Cambodia's GDP comes from tourism (OECD), and many conservation projects are funded through small-scale ecotourism initiatives, providing benefits to communities who live around well-managed healthy natural systems.

Compounding the challenges presented by Covid-19 international and temporary national lockdowns, in 2019-2020 Cambodia faced its most severe drought in over four decades, dramatically deceasing rice yields (FAO). These challenges drove people back towards the unsustainable use of natural resources to fill a short-term food and livelihood deficit. Such events are likely to become more commonplace in the future, and local communities are often poorly prepared for these challenges, many debt-trapped in microfinance loans.

In Anlung Pring (AP) wetland, the Darwin Initiative has supported WWT and our partners to establish a successful integrated community-based conservation project which includes Community-based Ecotourism (CBET), wetland handicraft production, natural resource management and transitions towards sustainable agriculture. The primary community conservation association at AP is funded by the CBET, which normally sees 80% of its income coming from international tourists. Covid-19 restrictions have seen a total collapse of visitors, and core operating costs are being covered by partners, which cannot be sustained indefinitely.

Without functioning community conservation institutions, and with few benefits accruing from ecotourism and other alternative livelihoods, local people are likely to revert back to unsustainable practices, including overfishing, land encroachment, overharvesting of wetland plants and amphibians for fodder and food, and increased buffalo grazing on important biodiversity habitat.

Between 2014 and 2017, Darwin supported the establishment of the AP CBET. WWT also now have a Darwin Initiative project at AP to support communities to transition to sustainable agriculture and develop reserve management plans, climate change vulnerability assessments and international designation.

This proposed project provides immediate support to community conservation associations at AP, investigates approaches to build their resilience to similar future challenges, and develops technical and operational capacity to operate in the medium-long term with a lower reliance on the single income source of international tourism.

Component 1: To ensure the well-being and stability of wetland communities and conservation associations, the project will provide immediate crisis support through:

- Establishing 5 community-based savings groups managed by rural women within the community-based ecotourism scheme, allowing local people to contract emergency low-interest loans without resorting to high-interest micro-finance institutions. Interest generated will provide revenue to cover core costs for community conservation associations. [NL]
- Conducting educational events for CBET members and other interested parties to share Covid-19 preventive measures. [NL]
- Providing training on financial management to 50 households who are the most exposed groups, especially those currently tied into recently contracted microfinance loans, and those in marginalised groups with less access to other forms of finance. [NL]
- Providing sanitation equipment to the six schools surrounding AP. [NL]
- Creating a short-term rice bank offering subsidised food at the CBET centre, targeting at least 100 households most impacted by recent challenges. [NL]

Component 2: To support community associations to establish medium/long-term diverse and resilient income streams, the project will build local capacity through:

- Revising AP CBET's Business Plan, reviewing opportunities presented by the local tourism market and the potential to develop more sophisticated wetland products. [WWT]
- Providing a professional level training course to the handicraft team to improve the design and quality of their Lepironia grass products. [WWT]
- Marketing the handicraft in Phnom Penh, including an exhibition. [NL]
- Developing greater international/online sales channels, complementing a successful recent trial selling Lepironia bags at WWT shops in the UK. [WWT]
- Investing in a CBET Trust fund, generating an annual interest rate (currently 8% offered by most banks). The independent chairman of the CBET board can withdraw interest from this account every three months on receipt of a clear activity plan and budget. At least three members of the Committee must sign the bank slip to be authorised to receive the fund. [WWT]
- Developing and publishing promotional materials in Khmer language (poster and pamphlet, 1,000 copies each) to promote CBET and handicrafts in the Cambodian market. [WWT/NL]
- Re-designing the AP CBET website to include the handicrafts and support Khmer language. [WWT]
- Providing sanitation equipment to the ecotourism service providers. [WWT]

Short term changes:

- 100 local women will be enabled to contract short-term loans via community-based savings groups.
- 1000 local people will hear awareness messages on the importance of maintaining a healthy wetland for current and future livelihoods and food security during crises.
- 50 households will have improved financial crisis management capacities, with support to women prioritised.
- 300 students will have safer conditions in which to learn general schoolwork and environmental education during the Covid-19 pandemic.
- 100 poorest households will receive food relief packages from the CBET group.
- 10 handicraft makers (women) linked to the CBET will receive training and support to adapt products to take advantage of wider local and international market opportunities.
- Quarterly orders of handicraft group products will increase by 300% with sales resulting from a marketing exhibition in Phnom Penh and new local/international sales channels.

Long term changes:

- The Community Ecotourism Trust fund at AP generates \$ per year to support ongoing CBET costs.
- 25 households directly generating income from the CBET (staff, caterers, contractors, associated businesses etc) have a secure income into the future.
- 300 national tourists visit the site in 2021, laying the foundation for upscaling domestic travel to the site in the future.
- Handicraft groups linked to the CBET generate an improved annual income at with a percentage contributing to core CBET operating costs.
- Populations of sarus crane remain stable at the site as a result of no substantial increase in disturbance to the wetland.

Section 8 - Aims, Objectives and Exit Strategy

Q16. Aims and objectives

Aim: The aim of this project is to prevent the short-term unsustainable exploitation and disturbance of Anlung Pring Protected Landscape, a threat which has emerged as a result of challenges that local people are facing due to Covid-19 restrictions. The project will also build resilience into the funding model of the Community-based Ecotourism initiative, generating income through Trust Funds, Community-Based Savings Groups, attracting national tourists, and diverse handicraft schemes.

Objectives: Within this three month project:

- CBET income is starting to be generated in three new ways by the end of March 2021; \$ of quarterly bank interest from the CBET Trust Fund, \$ in handicraft sales commission, \$ from national tourists visiting the site.
- Community-based savings groups have been established, with 15 women contracting loans by March

2021, and a further 85 women reporting that they are able to easily access funds as and when needed and are more confident in financial management.

- Local schools and community organisations are operating in line with best international Covid-19 safety guidance, and 1,000 local people are aware of the importance of maintaining a healthy wetland for current and future livelihoods and food security during crises.

This project is designed to develop resilience away from international tourism and conservation philanthropy. Trust funds, community-based savings groups and new business models will be in place and operational by the end of this three month Darwin project. It is important to note that WWT and NL also have a long-term presence at the site, including a Darwin Initiative project until March 2022, so will be able to offer continued advisory support to ensure the schemes are being implemented in accordance with original plans.

Community associations have proven their ability to operate efficiently and independently in the past, giving us confidence that these investments will be managed well into the future.

Some elements of this project are by nature not long-term interventions; the rice foodbank scheme for example. These are emergency measures to help the most vulnerable local people from suffering and resorting back to unsustainable natural resource use, which would likely have negative impacts upon biodiversity including the regionally threatened Sarus crane, the flagship species for the ecotourism project. These short-term interventions therefore help to secure the long-term feasibility of the tourism project, and have an important indirect role in maintaining 'business as usual' once restrictions are eased.

WWT has an established project approval process, through which inter-departmental committees analyse all risk factors and complete a project risk register, also ensuring compliance with Darwin T&Cs. All projects are subject to WWT's financial management policies and procedures.

Key financial risks for this project are:

Corruption. WWT takes a zero-tolerance approach to corruption and has a robust Anti-Bribery Policy. We will clearly stipulate zero tolerance in all contracts, sub-grants and agreements and continue to monitor/enforce this tightly.

Community's capacity to manage funds. WWT has a community conservation officer with significant experience of working with the local communities and helping them to generate and manage local funds. The CBET is well-established and has clear financial policies; activities under this project will be embedded into these. This is accompanied by a regular monitoring and spot-check mechanism.

Exchange rate fluctuations. We are aware that there is a lot of uncertainty in global markets, and Brexit may also affect the Sterling value over the coming months. Most expenditure is pegged to the US dollar, so exchange rates will be carefully monitored and local (US\$) budgets adjusted accordingly.

Risks are monitored quarterly by a Project Steering Committee, which will also monitor risks for this project.

We are not planning to purchase any capital items through this project.

The Operating Costs budget line includes sanitation stations and items such as hand sanitiser and PPE, which will remain in situ in the local schools and CBET centre after the end of the project.

The project budget has been developed by WWT and NL, who have worked in the project area for several years and have a good understanding of the costs involved in working there, as well as the staff time required for different activities.

Training costs (eg. travel, subsistence, consultancy costs) are based on recent actual costs, salary costs are based on current rates, and consumable costs (sanitiser, PPE, promotional materials) are derived from current market prices.

This project builds on our ongoing Darwin Initiative Main Grants project, allowing it to benefit from staffing and infrastructure already in place. WWT will provide considerable in-kind funding in the form of staff time to support this project, particularly technical support from UK-based staff, whose salaries have not been included in this budget. Monitoring visits for this project and the Main Grants project will be combined in order to maximise efficiency.

WWT has well-established financial management systems to ensure that funds are used efficiently, and will take steps to manage financial risks through the existing Project Steering Committee. When purchasing goods and services, WWT and NL will adhere to rigorous procurement procedures to ensure best price and quality.

This project has the potential to leverage significant impact beyond the project timeframe, as it centres on enhancing local knowledge, skills and structures for medium to long term community based conservation, rather than solely focusing on immediate Covid-19 related needs.
