Responses to specific issues raised by reviewer:

1 This is a relatively straightforward project in terms of its structure, the complexity arises in the delivery.

There certainly have been complications in delivery, but we hope that most of these are now under control given that permission for release of funding to Xiayunling district has been agreed. There has been an inevitable delay in establishing the education centre. We have exceeded our expectations at this stage regarding scientific outputs from the project. We have 4 papers in press in refereed journals already (fourth one accepted Nov 1). The delay has been in the development of the Education centre. We have made contributions to the display materials at the nearby research centre (see http://www.bio.bris.ac.uk/research/bats/China%20bats/Research%20Centre%20photo s.htm), and the first school party has visited that site to partly compensate for this. We will now ensure that the Education Centre opens in April 2007.

2 The change of location is unfortunate but was unavoidable. The Logical Framework and associated project management details need to be revised to account for this change. At present, the Project Purpose simply states that the bat centre in Beijing is for promotion of bat conservation in southern China: Guangzhou is some 1,800 Km distant and while dissemination materials can be made available, visits will require funding.

The Logical Framework was modified in February 2006 and agreed with the Darwin secretariat so that funding could be transferred to Beijing. The purpose is now to promote bat conservation in China, rather than southern China specifically. We do not therefore anticiapt5e visits to Guangzhou any longer, so funding will not be required for this (travel

will be restricted to Beijing instead, and the costings will be similar to those planned for Guangzhou).

3 Progress with the building and opening of the centre in Beijing needs to be reflected in milestones and reports.

A new timetable with milestones is presented above. Specific detail is given for the next 6 month period, at the end of which we anticipate opening of the Education centre.

4 The project has made contact with a relevant conservation centre in Hong Kong, that may allow re-ignition of the southern dimension.

This contact was especially important when we planned to run the education centre from Guangzhou, which is close to Hong Kong. Although t the centre will be relocated to Beijing, collaboration with Hong Kong is still being maintained. Kadoorie Farm has recently produced an education booklet about Chinese bats and their conservation, and we will use this as a model for our own booklet that will be distributed via the Education Centre.

5 The original strategy for post project sustainability was to seek funding from the local governments in Guangdong during the final year of the project. This now seems a less likely possibility and local funding will be sought from around Beijing. Although it is accepted that there have to be activities taking place to generate local interest in future funding, a time bound strategy, starting immediately is required if these funds are to be secured.

Initially the centre will be run with funding from the Chinese Academy of Sciences. If the first year of the centre proves successful, we will seek additional funding from Xiayunling district.

6 The Project Leader notes the time he has spent on administrative matters relating to operations in China. Consideration should be given to using part of the savings on a part-time local support staff person.

There are no obvious savings in the budget to date, and so there is no clear option available for this support.
