What is participatory protected area management?

Participatory management = collaborative management

In recent decades major changes have occurred in nature conservation philosophy. We have witnessed a move towards ecosystems and processed; embracing of adaptive management; and increasing recognition of the role of participation and the value of local knowledge and traditional institutions involved in natural resource protection.

Participation in protected area (PA) management is the process through which some or all stakeholders relevant

for a protected area are involved <u>substantially</u> in management activities.

As part of this process, the institution responsible for administering the PA develops partnerships with stakeholders (first and foremost with local people and users of natural resource) which

specify and guarantee the role, the rights and responsibilities of each party with respect to the PA.

There are several types of participation (see page 2) which can be employed, depending on the aims of those concerned and local circumstances.
