



INTERNATIONAL WORKSHOP ON CONSERVATION EDUCATION FOR THE ANDEAN CAT



Report to WCN
February 2006

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The Workshop was held in Salta, ARGENTINA, from the 14th to the 16th of November 2005.

It counted with the Endorsement of the Cat Specialist Group (IUCN), financial support from WCN (USA) and Darwin Initiative (UK).

ACTIVITIES

Before proceeding to discuss the main goal of designing a common strategy for a global education program of local communities to support conservation of the Andean cat, each participant introduced him/herself and gave a presentation of his/her experience related to education and Andean cat, with the aim of identifying potential skills of participants and problems experienced in educational activities. This session was particularly useful to identify the points in common as well as the differences between countries and indigenous populations.

C. Sillero-Zubiri, another partner of WCN, shared its experiences as leader of the Ethiopian wolf conservation program and provided useful suggestions on the general issues concerning carnivore conservation in a developing country.

Following this first session, representatives were provided a draft list of all procedures, tools and techniques used until the moment for the educational activities

on the Andean cat and were asked to analyze and comment each one of them to decide about their potential inclusion in the global strategy.

To accomplish this task, participants split into two groups: one concentrated on young community members, while the other worked on adult education and participation.

These are the items that were analyzed:

1. DIAGNOSTIC
2. EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES
 - Pre-school-age kids
 - Primary-school-age kids
 - Secondary-school-age kids
 - School teachers
 - Adults
 - General public
3. EVALUATION

At the end of this phase, the two groups shared with the rest of participants their conclusions and suggestions for the implementation of each activity.

OUTPUTS

The results of this analysis were then organized in a **Final Document** that has been later edited by M.J. Merino and M. Lucherini and mailed to all participants in January. This document is available, under request, at edugattaller@yahoo.com.ar.

The main result of the workshop was that all participants agreed to share a common set of activities and strategies as a base for their educational activities. This common base can, of course, be modified in order to adapt it to different realities (e.g. site-specific local tradition, individual project needs, different culture, etc.).



EVALUATION



Q1. Personal level of motivation to participate in the Workshop




Q2. How many of the other participants were interested in participating in the workshop?




Q3. How many opportunities did you have to exchange experiences/ideas with the other participants?


Q4. Was there integration between organizers and participants?




Q5. The duration of the workshop was:
