Mar 08	Project Presented At 9th Asian Apiculture Association Conference In Vietnam	This Conference has not taken place.
By end of Mar 08	2nd Project Stakeholder Workshop held in NBR: 50 participants from NBR informed about the Project and its progress	Stakeholder workshop organized – 32 tribal participants from NBR were updated on the Project on March 11 th 2008. Meeting minutes available.
By end of May 08	Local partner has organised facilities to create the Indigenous Bee and Biodiversity Resource Unit within existing campus Keystone in NBR	100 students from Schools in Nilgiris participated in a one day programme at the IBBRU in the Bee Museum. This was to celebrate one year of the School Programmes being launched through IBBRU. Resource persons from local NGOs took part in this programme. Dame Hillary Blume, of Charities Advisory Trust, UK was the Chief Guest of the Programme. Programme consisted of Quizzes, Essay writing and debate on specific biodiversity

		related topics. IBBRU is in touch with resources persons from the Centre for Environment Education and we are looking at full time environmental education as a curriculum for schools in the district.
By end of May 08	Six consultations have taken place with members of Tribal Advisory Council living adjacent to 5 sites	Twice a month meetings in Coonoor and Kotagiri areas have been held on various governance, and community leadership issues within the tribal communities. Community members from all 5 sites of the project took active part in the wild foods festival at Kotagiri on April 29 th 2008. People participated by bringing exhibits of the uncultivated foods from their respective areas.
By end of May 08	Livelihood-relevant indigenous bee species at 5 sites identified and classified	Yes. Identification processes are underway. A visiting Entomologist from Calicut University, Kerala – Santhosh Shreevihar, has completed the identification of all pan trap specimens. More than 30 types of bee samples were sent to UK for analysis of genetic material.
By end of May 08	Six people trained in UK: on bee science (four people, three weeks), and apicultural information systems and networks (two people, three weeks)	Concerning the training in bee science, we considered that the best use of funds was for one partner to travel to India to provide the training. This was achieved by Stuart Roberts' visit to Keystone Foundation in February 2008. Concerning training in apicultural information systems, Ms Sneh Nath and Ms Shiny Rehel visited DI partner organisation Bees for Development for three weeks in April 2008.
By end of Jun 08	Fifth media report provided to press, radio, TV in UK and India (national and local)	On August 9th, 2008 – more than 500 tribal participants from all 5 project locations participated in the World Indigenous Day Celebrations at Kotagiri. This was covered extensively by the media (The Hindu, Regional papers) as
