1. Outline progress over the last 6 months (April – September) against the agreed baseline timetable for the project (if your project has started less than 6 months ago, please report on the period since start up).

The only Darwin Initiative project funding remaining in the award is for publication of illustrated lists. Progress on this has been slow in the past six months in part because of our main activity, which has been intensive project legacy work, but also because Dinarzarde Raheem was away from the UK for longer than planned, as explained below. Fred Naggs was at Chulalongkorn University Bangkok, where he is a Visiting Professor, from the end of June until the end of July. One week in July was spent at the World Congress of Malacology in Phuket where the current Darwin Initiative project and earlier Darwin Initiative land snail projects were highlighted, most notably in the session run by Fred Naggs on land snail systematics in Asia and in the session on tropical land snail ecology run by Dinarzarde Raheem. Dinarzarde Raheem does not currently hold a post but she has become a Research Associate in the Department of Zoology at the NHM and has received a Research Award from the Malacological Society of London and a Small Ecological Projects Grant from the British Ecological Society that has enabled her to carry out fieldwork in Sri Lanka. Fred Naggs was engaged in collaborative work in Malaysia throughout September with Chris Wade, University of Nottingham, the Universiti Sains Malaysia, Penang, and Universiti Sains Malaysia, Sabah.
