2. Give details of any notable problems or unexpected developments that the project has encountered over the last 6 months. Explain what impact these could have on the project and whether the changes will affect the budget and timetable of project activities.

As documented in the previous Annual Report, the security situation in Congo Brazzaville prohibits further activities in country. A recent assessment of the situation indicates conditions remain unsuitable.

In discussion with the Darwin secretariat and ETCF, we have shifted our final period of field research to DRC. The study area, the Mayombe Mountains, straddles the border between Congo and DRC, and we are therefore surveying the same biogeographic region.

The approach and methods will remain unchanged but the geographic location will switch to DRC. The overall analysis and related outputs will be unaffected. No additional budget is requested.

Training and dissemination activities in Congo Brazzaville have had to be curtailed. However, we aim to seek opportunities in DRC to deliver findings to the government and NGOs.

Have any of these issues been discussed with the Darwin Secretariat and if so, have changes been made to the original agreement?

Yes. The workplan and Logframe will be updated accordingly, but the original agreement stands.
