## Output 1: Increased knowledge and understanding of forest habitats

In **Y1-Y3**, we completed several field surveys and community workshops that led to completion of a Participatory Management Plan (PMP) (for Dashtijum (DJ) only), four species status reports and action plans and a Household survey report.

In **Y4**, we focussed on disseminating these completed reports among the local communities and Forest Service Units at both project sites and to the Agency for the Forestry. These reports will help the forest product users to better understand threats to the forest habitat and the various strategies available to manage and monitor the use of forest resources, and conservation of priority species.

During **Y4**, in September, FFI, Kulob Botanical Garden (KBG), FSU staff and Zam Zam jointly completed an expedition to collect additional GPS data in DJ and Childukhtaron (CH) reserves, and monitor results of earlier fencing and planting. Data will help FSUs to measure success of tree planting and fenced monitoring plots across both reserves.

Monitoring forms established by FFI as part of a Joint Forest Management approach (a national policy that promotes devolution of forest management responsibility to local 'lease-holders') in Year 3 are being used in the field by leaseholders; and all data will be collated by FFI and the FSUs in December to measure any changes to the states of their plots after one year.

Completion of a PMP for CH was planned for March 2020 but then postponed to November 2020 due to COVID-19 as the travel of our international consultant Mr. Kamel Chorfi was cancelled. The consultant will provide online training to FFI and KBG staff on facilitation methods, and they will conduct the workshop, subject to a further review of health and safety.

## Output 2: Improving income from fruit and nuts

Since the start of the project, FFI along with its local partner Zam Zam established saving and producer groups to contribute to the wellbeing of local communities, following

recommendations of a Participatory Market System Development (PMSD) plan completed in Y1. In Y1-Y3, at both project sites 6 producer groups and 8 saving groups were active. In Y4, the same 8 saving groups are active, but the numbers of the members increased from 184 to 200 people and the same 160 members are active in Producer groups. Data on income and the saved funds for Y4 will be collected in December as harvesting is ongoing in both sites. This year, due to unexpected snowfall and a drop in the temperature during the flowering season of most of the fruits, the harvest level of some fruits is expected to be low, especially in Childukhtaron reserve. This is the second year running where poor weather has impacted harvest.

Although the impacts of COVID-19 have necessitated a significant reduction in activities with local communities, Zam Zam have found alternative and creative ways to continue support provided through **Y1-Y3**. As social events and gatherings were cancelled, Zam Zam recorded the trainings for producer and saving groups on DVD disks and along with handouts, distribute these among the saving and producer groups members. One practical training for the members of the producer groups is planned in November, involving traveling to the North of Tajikistan, Istaravshan city, to meet with representatives of a fruit drying company. To improve our understanding of the impact of the PMSD approach on community wellbeing and the overall impact of the project, a Participatory Impact Assessment is planned by the end of **Y4**, during February and March, 2021.

In order to support the local communities during this unprecedented time FFI, through its emergency funding, provided financial support to buy additional small canning and fruit processing equipment for the members of producer groups, helping people to reduce the need to use shared equipment. Other measures to promote the safety and protection of group members from COVID-19 included provision of antiseptic products, gloves and facemasks to 360 community members at DJ and CH.

## Output 3: Forest management and promoting resilience

Supporting forest restoration: At the beginning of **Y4**, agreements signed with the FSUs of both project sites for planting fruit and non-fruit seeds and saplings in the forests and nurseries. As per the agreement, starting from December 2020, 37200 saplings/seeds (9 species) will be planted in CH Reserve and 55000 saplings/seeds (13 species) in DJ Reserve (co-funded with the Global Trees Campaign (GTC)) to support the restoration and diversification of the forest. In addition, in **Y4** FFI secured co-funding from Lift Economy to increase tree-planting further by an additional 83,321 saplings (18 species) in DJ and CH reserves. In total, by the end of Y4, 175,521 saplings will be planted in the forests of DJ and CH reserves. This adds to planting of more than 400,000 trees completed Y1-3.

During **Y1-Y3**, 19 plot-holders were supported to fence plots to protect their land from grazing and enable greater regeneration. In **Y4**, our community mobilisers identified 28 more households with threatened tree species in their gardens and plots and who demonstrated interest in protecting them. With funding from GTC these households were provided with fencing materials.

No notable problems were experienced, apart from delays related to Covid-19, described below.

Due to the spread of COVID-19 and a following curfew, some of the projects activities - especially those related to local community participation and social gatherings - were postponed or adapted.			
Despite all the restrictions, our partner Zam Zam together with FFI Tajikistan came to the solution that instead of providing trainings to the saving and producer groups, the learning materials and modules were recorded on DVD disks and printed handouts were distributed to the members of the groups so they can learn individually. The distribution process took place in the villages located at both project sites, and precautions were taken to follow the safety regulations and maintain a social distance between the participants.			
Another delay in regard to our planned activity for Y4, due to COVID-19, was the planned Participatory Management Plan for CH reserve, postponed as the international consultant could not travel to Tajikistan. He will provide online training and support to local trainers to complete this workshop in his place.
