1. Outline progress over the last 6 months (April – Sept) against the agreed project implementation timetable (if your project has started less than 6 months ago, please report on the period since start up to end September).

Two new Fish Conservation Committees have been formed and trained. FCCs in both areas had previously been dissolved due to poor performance and the Traditional Authorities (Senior Chiefs) had requested that new members should be recruited to ensure that the project operated well in these two areas. The two new FCCs are; Khonde FCC in stratum 5.3. and Liwaladzi FCC in stratum 5.4. 30% of the members of both FCCs are women. In total we now have 36 FCCs operating in the project area; 17 in Stratum 5.3, 10 in Stratum 5.4 and 9 in Stratum 5.5


38 meetings have been conducted ranging from community level to district level

Chambo breeding area audits have been conducted. These check the following within protected areas (breeding sites)

- Condition of the environment (ecology) around breeding area
- FCC activities around the breeding area
- How knowledgeable communities are about the bylaws
- Presence of baby fish within protected areas

The following shows the most recent audit report for the breeding areas in Nkhotakota District (including those in Strata 5.1 and 5.2 which do not fall into the Darwin Initiative project area)



36 FCC performance assessments have been conducted to check the following:

- Knowledge of FCC members on district fisheries bylaws
- Leadership (activeness of committee members in their day to day operations)
- Records showing how the committee members are executing their duties
- Improvement in fish catches
- FCC plans
- Relationship with relevant stakeholders such as chiefs and development structures ie Village Development Committee

The following is the latest performance data for one FCC in the project area to illustrate how we monitor the performance of the fish conservation committees. We can then target our next steps with each FCC in terms of additional support or training.

Fish Catch Data has also been collected over the last six months. We were asked in our annual report feedback to explain in this report how we are monitoring the accuracy of catch and income data. This is being checked by managers and co-ordinators who are carrying out spot checks to ensure that the data we are gathering are accurate. This is ongoing even during the Covid-19 pandemic and we are confident that the data reflects what is happening in each area.

- For Chambo, we are gathering three day samples of fish catches to monitor the numbers of small, medium and large fish in each daily catch
- For Usipa, we are carrying out 1 litre samples to determine the numbers of small, medium and large fish in each sample.

- Low numbers have been turning up for meetings due to Covid-19 restrictions. However, we are using phones to convey relevant messages to keep the project on track.
- Reduced meeting times due to Covid-19 restrictions on length of meetings. This has
 reduced the amount of information that we are able to cover in each meeting but project
 progress has not been adversely affected by this.
- We have had to adapt the way in which Ripple Africa and Fisheries staff monitor the project in order to reduce the risk of Covid-19 transmission. We are now spending a

shorter period of time in each location and talking with fewer fishing community members as we are limiting face to face contact with people. However, most FCCs are now experienced at gathering the necessary information about their area and we are confident that we have an accurate measure of the progress on the project through meetings with them and through the monitoring information that we gather.

 We have incurred additional costs for supplementary materials such as face masks, sanitizers, hand washing buckets and information leaflets on Covid-19 to ensure that the fishing communities are aware of how to protect themselves from Covid-19. FCC members have been trained to cascade Covid-19 prevention messages to other community members to ensure that they understand the importance of handwashing, social distancing and more recently the wearing of masks which the Government of Malawi now requires in public areas.
