WWT and the project partners have made a number of achievements over the past six months. Most notably, following some unavoidable delays due to weather we were able to complete the climate change vulnerability assessment for the lake. This involved several days of community consultations and further discussions with experts, and subsequent analysis. We have also undertaken multiple consultations with the local communities and departments of fisheries and environment to define a restoration plan for the community managed areas, which cover almost all of the lake, seasonally inundated forest and importantly the uplands in the watershed of the lake. The plan is now being implemented, with nurseries due to be established before the end of the calendar year to allow planting out of seedlings in 2024.

A new template for the Ramsar site restoration plan was devised by WWT's catchment planning specialist, and consultations were launched in the five project villages for the elaboration of the Tseny basin restoration. The draft plan has been prepared, and is being used to guide activities; as a first step we have now recruited and trained two local people to act as tree nursery managers, and purchased a number of materials for nursery construction.

We have also developed a threats assessment methodology to better guide lake restoration and management. We have also set up a technical group to begin the elaboration of the management plan for the lake and its watershed.

We also completed editing and reviewing several technical documents (socio-economic and fishers/collectors baseline surveys, a short report from our international mangrove day learning event, plus the biodiversity survey), which we are submitting along with this report.

The only problem we encountered was during a recent trip to the site by the WWT UK ichthyologist, who had planned to work with the local team and VOIs to use our new drone to map the lake in high resolution for the purpose of habitat monitoring and restoration planning. Despite having the required ethics approval from WWT, and the flight permit from the relevant authorities in Madagascar, there was some concern at the site that not all community members had been suitably informed of the nature and purpose of the drone flights. To avoid stoking fear of resource grabbing, spying or worse, the flight was postponed. The project management is pleased that safeguarding precautions are being taken seriously by the field team and are working, as reasonable mitigating actions can be quickly agreed in the field when concerns are raised. So despite the cost in time and effort, an important lesson was learned about the importance of making a thorough plan for activity-specific FPIC, and our mitigation procedures have been modified to reflect this learning. There have been no other notable problems or unexpected developments during the reporting period.
