1. Outline progress over the last 6 months (April – Sept) against the agreed project implementation timetable (if your project has started less than 6 months ago, please report on the period since start up to end September).

Our project launched in June 2022 and in the 4 months since then (up to end September 2022), we have completed all activities scheduled for this period in the project implementation timetable. A progress summary of each completed activity is shown below:

1) Staff recruitment [completed by end Aug 2022]

In addition to the senior technical staff named in the project proposal, project partners HERD and LI-BIRD have hired and inducted 13 full-time project staff: 1 Program Officer; 1 Senior Technical Assistant; 3 Agriculture Technicians and 8 Field-level Facilitators.

2) Provincial-level Pollination Workshop [4-5 Sept 2022]

A two-day event was hosted by our project partners: Ministry of Land Management, Agriculture and Cooperatives (MoLMAC) in the Karnali Province headquarters (Surkhet).

There were two components to the workshop: 1) a high-level stakeholder coordination meeting to share the aims and objectives of our project and discuss the collaborative roles that we can play with the provincial government departments; and 2) a technical training workshop on pollination management and policy development for technical government officers.

Participants included: the Permanent Secretary to the Ministry of Land Management, Agriculture and Cooperatives (MoLMAC) & and the Permanent Secretary to the Ministry of Industry, Tourism, Forest and Environment (MOITFE). There were also a range of other technical staff from provincial government departments.

The participants were overwhelmingly positive about the Darwin Initiative project as it aligns very closely with their mission to transition the whole province to organic agriculture.

3) District-level Stakeholder Engagement Workshop [7 Sept 2022]

A one-day event in Jumla District headquarters to share the aims and objectives of our project and seek feedback and buy-in from key local-level stakeholders.

Participants included: representatives from the District Agriculture Development Office, District Forest Office, Office of District Development Committee, District Public Health Service Office and the Agriculture Research Station, Jumla.

We received a highly positive response to our project aims & objectives, particularly regarding the management of apple pollination (apples are the backbone of the agricultural economy in Jumla). The District Agriculture Office requested that its staff (extension workers) join some of our Farmer Field School sessions to learn about the management of pollination services. This request can be accommodated within our current budget.

4) Training of Trainers (ToT) Course [8-12 Sept 2022]

We conducted a 5-day Training of Trainers (ToT) course for all field-based project staff in Jumla. The ToT was coordinated and led by Field Coordinator Sujan Sapkota, Project Coordinator Dr Tom Timberlake, LI-BIRD Team Leader Dr Shree Neupane and Technical Advisor Dr Kedar Devkota.

Course content covered technical pollination topics, education techniques (pedagogy), M&E requirements & community mobilisation. Participants demonstrated substantial improvements in technical understanding and capacity over the course of the training.

5) Project coordination meetings [31 Aug – 3 Oct 2022]

Project Coordinator Tom Timberlake visited Nepal for 5 weeks during the main project implementation phase. The project team held a number of productive coordination meetings during this time.

2. Give details of any notable problems or unexpected developments/lessons learnt that the project has encountered over the last 6 months. Explain what impact these could have on the project and whether the changes will affect the budget and timetable of project activities.

Whilst not a problem, the Ministry of Land Management, Agriculture and Cooperatives (MoLMAC) have become highly engaged with our project and requested some additional training resources which will slightly increase the project workload.

MoLMAC view pollination management as integral part of their organic agriculture mission and requested us to provide them with a prescriptive Training of Trainers curriculum and a Farmer Field School curriculum on pollination management. They also requested guidance on developing a new pollination syllabus for their provincial training centres.

Given that these requests align very closely with our project aims and will contribute to meeting our overall project outcomes, we have agreed to fulfil them. These additional activities require

no additional budget , only an allocation of staff time, which we can accommodate. We are confident that these additional activities will not detract from our ability to meet all other project outputs. We therefore believe that no formal change request is needed.
