Outline progress over the last 6 months (April – Sept) against the agreed project implementation timetable (if your project has started less than 6 months ago, please report on the period since start up to end September).

During the last 6 months (since the time of the annual report), we have made the following progress, in accordance with our original project implementation timetable:

- 1) Pollinator awareness classes a further c.200 pollinator awareness classes have been held since the last reporting period (April 2023); these have reached a total of 6400 participants (60% women). Whereas the Year 1 awareness classes focused primarily on farmers, the more recent awareness classes have included many school children as well, with a total of 22% child attendees.
- 2) <u>Farmer Field School (FFS) sessions</u> A further 34 FFS sessions have been held since the last reporting period. The first 12-month cycle of these FFS sessions is about to be completed after which point a new cohort of farmers will be recruited to participate in the next round of sessions. In late September, our M&E team held a feedback workshop with participants of the FFS program to hear about their experiences. We have documented all of this feedback and will adapt our next round of sessions accordingly. A widely applicable FFS manual for pollination management is in the process of being developed; this will be published within the next year.
- 3) <u>Stewardship Scheme monitoring</u> Between April and October 2023 regular monitoring surveys were carried out by project staff to record plant and pollinator diversity and crop yields on farms that are implementing our Pollinator Stewardship Package. Surveys were also carried out on control sites and results will be analysed and presented in the Y2 annual report. Additionally, farmer surveys have been conducted on a subset of the farmers attending our awareness classes to record the uptake and impact of our sessions.
- 4) Pollinator awareness video In May 2023 we published a professionally edited and translated YouTube video on the value of pollinators for agriculture in Nepal. This was aimed at farmers, policy-makers and the general public. So far this has received >400 views and can be accessed here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Ts3l0Kd7ttc
- 5) <u>Capacity-building workshops a further two capacity building workshops were held in Karnali Province since the last reporting period.</u> These covered the districts of Jajarkot, and Salyan (together with West Rukum) and were attended by a total of 71 participants (16%) women).
- 6) <u>Crop-pollinator visitation surveys visitation data and pollinator exclusion experiment data has been collected for a total of 6 crops (Avocado, Cardamom, Coffee, Citrus, Mango, Soybean) across Nepal. The insect specimens have been identified and the students conducting the work are now writing their theses.</u>
- 7) Pollinator Action Plan progress the Technical Working Group (TWG) for the formulation of a pollinator strategy for Karnali Province has met twice in the last 6 months. This group includes representatives from the Karnali ministry, as well as academics and practitioners from a range of relevant sectors. Together they have compiled an outline of the pollinator strategy which will now be developed into a comprehensive strategy document. We have developed a questionnaire which will be distributed to 106 agricultural officers and other stakeholders from across the province to seek their feedback on the pollinator strategy and ensure wide participation and ownership of this process.

we received an updated quote from a Nepalese laboratory for the nutritional analysis of these samples, the price was far higher than originally budgeted, making the work unaffordable. We have submitted a change request (in a separate email) requesting to utilise these funds for some alternative activities that will add greater value to the project. 3.
