1. Outline progress over the last 6 months (April – September) against the agreed project implementation timetable (if your project started less than 6 months ago, please report on the period since start up to end of September).

Towards output 1: An cumulative area of 1020ha have been established and designated as Gbanraun Community Conservation Area (657ha) and Kokoloama Community Conservation Area (363ha) areas and since from September to November 2025, they have been registered on the ICCA registry <a href="https://www.iccaregistry.org/">https://www.iccaregistry.org/</a> and World Database of Protected Area (WDPA) <a href="https://www.protectedplanet.net/">https://www.protectedplanet.net/</a>. The boundaries of these sites have been demarcated on ground and community rangers are regularly on patrol enforcing the comminsl laws protecting the site.

- 1.2 In the Apoi Community Conservation Area (ACCA), there has been 3 incidences of illegal logging which was discovered early and stopped by the community rangers. These incidences occurred in July and August and have led us to find solutions to improve on protection. Firstly, we have installed two rangers 21m high patrol post in two strategic locations of the forest to allow for early detection of illegal activities.
- 2.1 A total of 33 persons have been trained and engaged in habitat restoration efforts in the 2 local communities i.e. Gbanraun and Kokoloama are engaged in seed gathering, air-layering and raising an estimate 6,000 seedling on a monthly basis. The specific species of trees in this

tree planting efforts are *Irvingia gabonensis*, commonly called bush mango seeds and *Garcinia kola* which are important economic trees for the people and the wildlife. Also, *Prioria mannii* which is an important food tree of the Niger Delta red colobus monkey and one of the chief factors that informed the species' restricted range in this Marsh forest but unfortunately it has extinct in Gbaraun and Kokoloama forest thus reason why replanting is very critical. All three plant species are listed as either Near threatened or Vulnerable on the IUCN red list. Tree nurseries have been constructed In the communities and 8 staff called tree guardians recruited working alongside with paid adhoc staff to produce 4000-6000 seedlings monthly. No trees have been planted yet.

- 3.1. We have been engaging with the Bayelsa State government together with the community particularly with the technical adviser to the Governor on Entrepreneurial Development but progress has been slow. In the meantime, we are working closely with the community leadership to renovate the schools, and they have agreed to recruit teachers while we support with teachers' salaries pending when there is government support for it. We have also completed the construction of solar-powered borehole water projects in both communities with a capacity to store 10,000 litres of portable water. Since we made provision for healthcare facilities and monthly salary payments of two certified healthcare workers in Apoi community through a prior project grant with another partner organization, we are working with Gbanraun and Kokolama communities to find the best way to harmonize the healthcare provision for all three communities.
- 3.2. We have been trying to engage productively with both Bank of Industry especially through the Bayelsa chapter of SMEDAN <a href="https://smedan.gov.ng/">https://smedan.gov.ng/</a> including the government of Bayelsa State through the technical adviser to the Governor on Entrepreneurial Development but no concrete progress in this regard. This sort of slow progress is not unexpected. In the meantime, we have provided training in financial literacy, agri and fishery product sustainable harvesting, processing, preservation, packaging, marketing and branding on order to boost sales and profits for local-based MSMEs. So far, the trainees also receive technical support from us to constitute themselves into cooperatives that are now currently into diverse businesses such as vegetable, locust beans and peeled beans dehydration. fish, snail, periwinkle (i.e. brackish water snails), cassava and plantain processing, packaging, marketing and branding. This only commenced this November and impact will be monitored and measured in subsequent months. 4.1. The two focus communities in this project have successfully developed and enacted
- 4.1. The two focus communities in this project have successfully developed and enacted communal laws to govern the management of the community conservation area.
- 4.2. There are plans in place to facilitate a species action plan workshop in mid-2026.
- 4.3. Following a successful public forum organized in March 2025 to discuss the importance of policy to protect wildlife, we submitted a 42-page document in July 2025 which condenses the discussions and recommendations made during this public forum to the Bayelsa State House of Assembly and we have since been following up on the progress/attention given to the subject matter.
- 4.4. Radio show was launched in September 2024, and there has been some landmark events in the State that can be linked to be influenced by this public awareness tool.

The slow progress we have experienced on every front of government engagement with regards to partnership in enhancing local livelihood of the communities through infrastructural development and boosting MSMEs in the communities, though seemingly not outside of the ordinary was still unexpected for us. Nearly 200 families have benefited from our support, so we still expect to meet our target by project end.
