#### Cross-cutting:

To make the methods and results publicly available (activity 2.3), a journal manuscript was drafted. The manuscript will be finalised and submitted by Q4 of Year 2. The methods and results were also presented at the Society of Ecological Restoration (SER) World Congress in Australia in September 2023.

## Philippines:

A stakeholder workshop with FLR implementers was organised in September 2023 to review species distribution maps and gather additional occurrence data to further improve the predictions of the distribution models. The results were presented at the Congress on Sustainable and Climate Resilient Watershed Management through Ecosystem-based Approaches in the Asia-Pacific Region (24-26 October, 2023, Philippines). Terms of Reference were prepared for a web developer to develop a seed information system for the Mindanao Forest Tree Seed Centre (MFTSC), with recruitment being finalised as of October 2023. Local nurseries producing native trees in the Mindanao region are being identified, with site visits and capacity strengthening in seed collection and seedling production scheduled for Q3 of Year 2.

#### Indonesia:

The sub-contract was signed after prolonged negotiations on 1 May 2023. However, the partner could only receive funds in October 2023 and so field activities could not be implemented in Q1-Q2 of Year 2 (see Section 2). The information system (online database) on forest tree seed developed in Year 1 of the project received approval from the Director General of Watershed Control and Forest Rehabilitation (BPDASRH), Ministry of Environment and Forestry, for national use (Standard indicator DI-B02). To initiate the nation-wide adoption of the information system, a National Coordination meeting was held in August 2023 to present the database to stakeholders, and gather input from the representatives of the central and regional governments who are responsible for managing tree seed sources throughout Indonesia.

The methods and early results of the project were also presented to stakeholders at a widely attended Talk series by the National Research and Innovation Agency's (BRIN) Research Center for Plant Conservation, Botanical Gardens and Forestry. The event featured presentations by the Director of Forest Tree Seeds of the Ministry of Environment and Forestry and BRIN. The hybrid event was attended by approximately 590 participants, many of whom expressed support for the project to be implemented across the country.

From the start, the project has received appreciation from the Directorate of Forest Tree Seed because the activities could directly support the Directorate's main tasks. The Directorate has shown a strong willingness to work with BRIN to continue these activities in the coming years, beyond the project duration.

#### India:

Project sub-contract was signed after prolonged negotiations on 15 May 2023. However, they could not receive funds until October 2023 (see Section 2), and so activities could not be implemented in Q1-Q2 of Year 2. Memorandum of Understanding between the Indian Council of Forestry Research and Education (ICFRE, research institute under the Indian Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change) and Lead partner was agreed on, with signing scheduled for November 2023. The agreement demonstrates significant interest and commitment by Government of India for forest and landscape restoration and genetic resources conservation, and lays an important foundation for continuing collaboration on these topics for the next several years.

### Bangladesh:

Memorandum of Understanding between the Economic Relations Division of Government of Bangladesh and the Lead partner was signed on 17 September 2023. Again, the agreement demonstrates significant interest and commitment by the Government for the project themes and lays a foundation for long-term collaboration. Nevertheless, the sub-contract has not yet been signed and so the partner could not yet receive funds nor start implementation (see Section 2)

2. Give details of any notable problems or unexpected developments/lessons learnt that the project has encountered over the last 6 months. Explain what impact these could have on the project and whether the changes will affect the budget and timetable of project activities.

While subcontracts have now been signed with India and Indonesia, the country partners could not receive project funds until October 2023. In India, the first funds transfer was held by antimoney laundering compliance screening, which the transfer for some reason did not pass, and the funds were returned to the lead partner in September 2023. We then re-attempted the transfer on 19 September in US\$ instead of GBP, based on information that it may be more successful, and the partner confirmed receipt of funds finally in October 2023, allowing them to start implementation.

In Indonesia, a new government procedure requires each project to open a bank account and this was only completed in October 2023, after which the funds were immediately transferred to the partner.

Subcontract still has not been signed with Bangladesh and realistically, they will not have the time to implement the planned in-country activities in the remaining 6 months of the project. We have, therefore, agreed to submit a change request to allocate the respective funds to instead organising a results workshop at the end of the project.

These delays unfortunately have a significant impact on the project as the partners were not able to implement in-country activities without first receiving the funds. Year 1 funds for in Indonesia were spent through direct spending arrangements with the leading partner and so only the Year 2 activities and spending were affected. For India and Bangladesh, similar arrangements were not possible and so in-country activities and spending have been on hold for both Years 1 and 2. The affected countries will not be able to complete the project activities within Year 2, hence we have submitted a 12-month project extension and financial change request.

*The low actual expenditure as of 30 September 2023 is due to the delays in having the sub-agreements signed as outlined in the change request. This has led to the delay in implementation by partners and no financial reports have yet been received. Lead partner's Year 2 budget (apart from overheads) was already re-allocated to Year 1 (CR22-113) to allow partners to delay their spending to Year 2 while waiting for the subcontracts to be signed.		
However, as per the change request submitted, we are expecting to fully expend the rebudgeted £ in FY 2023/24. A new financial change request has been submitted as of 31 October 2023 to request rebudgeting of the underspent funds to a new implementation Year 3, given the significant administrative challenges at partner organisations.
