Biodiversity conservation capacity building has been identified as a national need for Haiti and an overall regional priority for the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) of which Haiti is a member. The Fifth National Report of the Republic of Haiti (Government of the Republic of Haiti, 2016) for the Convention of Biodiversity speaks to building institutional capacity for

environmental management. Objective Nine of the CARICOM Biodiversity Strategy aims to equip Caribbean stakeholders with the capacity, entry points and mechanisms for participatory management of biodiversity while protecting their rights and benefits (CANARI 2018). The Caribbean Strategy for Climate-Resilient Forests and Rural Livelihoods, targeting Haiti and four other countries (Food and Agriculture Organization 2019) notes the need to strengthen technical expertise, methodologies, processes and organisational capacity to support resilient forest livelihoods and enterprises. CANARI is the Regional Implementation Team (RIT) for the Critical Ecosystem Partnership Fund Phase II Investment in the Caribbean Islands (CEPFII). This fund provides grants mainly to local civil society organisations (CSOs) to implement biodiversity conservation and sustainable development actions within 32 priority Key Biodiversity Areas (KBAs) in the region. After an extensive participatory assessment that engaged 175 stakeholders from 94 organisations within civil society, government, the private sector and the donor community, the Ecosystem Profile was approved (December 2019) defining the strategy and investment priorities for CEPFII. Haiti is one of the highest priority countries for investment with 7 priority KBAs identified for targeted support, including: Aire Protégée de Ressources Naturelles Gérées de Baradères-Cayemites, Aire Protégée de Ressources Naturelles Gérées des Trois Baies, Lac Azuéi – Trou Caiman, Parc National Naturel de Grand Bois, Parc National Naturel Forét des Pins Unité 1, Parc National Naturel La Visite, and Parc National Naturel Macaya.

During the profiling process, Haitian stakeholders highlighted key needs to support biodiversity conservation in Haiti (CANARI 2017). These include capacity building for CSOs that may apply for grants in areas such as: protected area co-management, CSO-led research and strengthening alternative/sustainable livelihoods for biodiversity conservation. The Ecosystem Profile (Appendix 6) includes a list of 41 Haitian CSOs identified as being eligible for CEPF funding to support their work in and around the priority KBAs.

CANARI conducted a rapid mapping exercise of Caribbean CSO capacity, focusing on CSOs that play a role in environmental management and biodiversity conservation. Indicative results are presented in Chapter 9 of the Ecosystem Profile and show that the capacity of Caribbean civil society, including in Haiti, needs to be strengthened for conservation action by focusing (in part) on (i) improved technical skills and competencies to implement conservation actions, data collection and management, invasive species management and co-management of sites; and (ii) increased peer sharing and learning, particularly through face-to-face meetings and exchanges of grantees and the conservation community at national and regional level.

Although CEPFII programme will include capacity building support for CSOs in Haiti, deeper support is required to build the technical capacity of key individuals working within selected CSOs to bolster capacity building efforts.

Haiti, like many developing nations, has found it difficult to fulfill its obligations under international biodiversity and development conventions, treaties and agreements to which it is signatory [e.g. CBD, UNFCCC, United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) and United Nations Forum on Forests (UNFF)] due to a lack of capacity to address emerging and increasingly complex and interconnected issues (CEPF 2019).

Civil society actors are critical players in the conservation of biodiversity, given their multiple roles in natural resource management, protection, and governance. Among the key challenges to biodiversity management in Haiti is the limited involvement of civil society in part due to their low levels of human and financial resources (CEPF 2019).

Additionally, while Haiti has some legislation, policies and plans relevant to biodiversity management [e.g. Decree of Management of the Environment (2006); Regulation of Citizens' Behaviour for Sustainable Development (2006), General Law on the Environment and General Law on Water], Haiti's national development agenda does not adequately address biodiversity (CEPF 2019). Haiti has, however, submitted its Fifth National Report to the Convention of Biodiversity and has recently completed its first National Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan.

The project will therefore seek to strengthen human capacity (Article 12 CBD; Articles 5 and 6 UNFCCC, Article 5 WHC; Article 19 UNCCD), particularly within CSOs for the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity (SDGs 14 and 15; Objective 1 UNFF) in Haiti. This will include improving technical knowledge and skills for conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity; building capacity among CSOs to advocate for national policy strengthening and building capacity of this important stakeholder group to more effectively engage in resource mobilisation efforts for biodiversity management initiatives (Article 20 UNCCD; SDG 15) in Haiti, including successfully bidding for grants through the Darwin Initiative grants, and other funding mechanisms, in the future.

To complement the expected biodiversity conservation advances under the CEPFII in Haiti, CANARI is proposing a fellowship programme to build Haitian CSO capacity on sustainable livelihoods and nature-based enterprises to support biodiversity conservation and reduce poverty. The programme will connect fellows nominated by Haitian CSOs that receive grants from CEPFII, with CANARI staff who have a wealth of experience working on sustainable livelihood/poverty reduction projects (CANARI 2021 a & b).

Haitian CEPFII grantee CSOs are expected to be selected between June to September 2022. Once finalised, these grantees will be approached to discuss capacity needs including those identified by the stakeholder meeting and capacity study described in Q10. Grantees will be asked to nominate potential fellows from within their organisations or communities. A tentative agenda/training schedule will be determined with each fellow and nominating organisation prior to arrival in Trinidad and Tobago (T&T). This will be finalised within the first two weeks of their time in T&T. Fellows will learn about tools, best practices and lessons learnt from past CANARI sustainable livelihood/nature-based enterprises work from respective project managers. They will gain practical experience using tools such as CANARI's Green Blue Radar, nature-based enterprises capacity assessment tool and climate proofing guides, emphasising gender considerations and climate proofing of sustainable livelihoods/nature-based enterprises.

Fellows will work alongside CANARI staff and be given tasks under sustainable livelihood/biodiversity conservation initiatives such as the ongoing CANARI ecotourism project in Trinidad's Nariva Swamp. This project follows CANARI's model of combining mentoring and micro-grants for business strengthening and ecosystem stewardship for target sustainable livelihoods/nature-based enterprises and community groups. The model enhances stakeholders' ability to generate an income while at the same time protecting the natural resources on which their livelihood/enterprise depends. Such a model dually addresses biodiversity conservation and poverty reduction.

Fellows will also work with and learn from CANARI's partner CSOs and nature-based enterprises in Trinidad. These have not yet been selected as they will be dependent on the specific Haiti CEPFII grantee and fellow interests identified after September 2022 as well as the Trinidad partner organisation's availability and capacity in 2023. Indicative CSOs and nature-based enterprises could include Nature Seekers and the Santa Cruz Green Market. Based on the needs identified by the grantee organisations, the Institute for Environment and Development (IIED) which CANARI has been collaborating with for over fifteen years, will provide additional sustainable livelihood/biodiversity conservation capacity building to fellows drawing on its global experiences. CANARI staff will also participate in the IIED training which will be conducted virtually.

Fellows will also receive training in innovative information and communication technology (ICT) tools used by CANARI,

including participatory videos using cell phones, and participatory GIS. Fellows will be required to produce one ICT product documenting their experiences and key learnings from their time in T&T.

Upon returning to Haiti, the fellows will work with their nominating organisations, coaching colleagues as needed for six months to apply tools, best practices and lessons learnt as it pertains to strengthening sustainable livelihoods for biodiversity conservation. Nominating CEPFII grantees will be invited to submit proposals to a micro-grant facility under the project to implement a concrete initiative in Haiti based on the learnings shared by the fellows. Fellows will be required to create another ICT product documenting their work and results during their final six-month fellowship period in Haiti, including the outputs of the microgrant projects. All products will be developed and narrated in Creole to facilitate extensive sharing with Haitian stakeholders and the wider Creole-speaking Caribbean (e.g. Guadeloupe, Martinique and Saint Lucia).

The management of the fellowship programme will be under the purview of the CANARI Technical Officer with responsibility for supporting Small and Micro-Enterprises (SMEs). CANARI's Programmes Director will provide oversight and the project will be integrated into CANARI's project management system. CANARI's Communications Officer will provide support, especially given the focus on ICT outputs). As a native French and Creole speaker, she will be able to liaise with CEPF Haitian grantees, fellows, CANARI staff and partners as needed. CANARI's Haiti Country Coordinator under the CEPFII project will support on-the-ground monitoring and evaluation of the microgrants and liaison with the nominating CSOs. CANARI's Administrative Officer will support logistical arrangements for the fellows. At least five other CANARI technical officers, including senior staff, will provide training and share lessons and best practices from various CANARI projects which focus/ed on supporting sustainable livelihoods and nature-based enterprises. All COVID-19 public health protocols in T&T and Haiti will be followed; the budget includes travel-related costs such as PCR tests.

Q13. How will you identify participants?

This initiative complements the CEPFII funding programme which has a thorough, transparent system of selecting CSOs to receive funding support based on competitive calls for proposals and an in-depth review process. The review process is supported by an independent, voluntary Regional Advisory Committee comprised of close to 20 experts in Caribbean biodiversity and sustainable development. Three to four Haitian experts also serve on the Regional Advisory Committee.

Successful Haitian organisations that become CEPFII grantees will be invited to submit nominations for the proposed fellowship programme. Potential fellows will be screened and interviewed by CANARI (including CANARI's Haiti Country Coordinator who is part of the CEPF Caribbean RIT) along with members of the CEPFII programme's Regional Advisory Committee. Indicative screening criteria will include professional and academic qualifications, past experience in working on biodiversity and sustainable livelihood projects and potential to contribute to the work of the nominating organisation upon return to Haiti. The selected fellows will be expected to return to the nominating organisations to advance their organisation's work on sustainable livelihoods in support of biodiversity conservation.

A gender balance will be sought, and the fellowship programme will specifically target early career professionals (i.e. less than 35 years of age). The selected fellows will need to have English language skills and be willing to travel to T&T for three months and commit to six months continued fellowship with their nominating organisation in Haiti. A maximum of six fellows will be supported; this number is based on the likely number of Haitian CEPF grantees.

Q14. Gender equality

The proposed initiative is complementary to the CEPFII and as such its execution will be guided by principles outlined in the CEPF Gender Toolkit. Gender as it pertains to sustainable livelihoods is also a stated CEPFII priority specifically to "support sustainable livelihoods in agriculture, fisheries, forestry, and nature tourism that enhance ecosystem resilience and landscape-level connectivity and deliver gender-equitable benefits, in order to maintain the functionality of priority sites".

The proposed project will commit to gender balance in the selection of fellows ensuring that at least 50% of the fellows are women. Fellows will also be exposed to CANARI's experiences in incorporating gender considerations into its sustainable

livelihood projects. These include the gender specific engagement methods utilised, factoring in the differences in the way men and women use natural resources as well as gendered inequalities in terms of access to services and funding to support their sustainable livelihoods and nature-based enterprises. CANARI will also expose fellows to the recommendations of its recent gender research projects such as the 2020 gender-based climate resilience analyses for nine countries under the UNDP Enabling Gender-Responsive Disaster Recovery, Climate and Environmental Resilience in the Caribbean (EnGenDER) Project.

The overall outcome anticipated for the project is that Haitian civil society organisations and conservation professionals will have increased capacity and enhanced knowledge to strengthen sustainable livelihoods to reduce poverty and threats to biodiversity in key biodiversity areas in Haiti.

Project short term beneficiaries include the six Haitian professionals who will participate in the fellowship programme building their capacity in sustainable livelihoods/biodiversity conservation. These will include at least three women and will also focus on young, early career professionals. The six nominating organisations which will also be Haitian CEPFII CSO grantees will be the other direct short-term beneficiaries. As these have not been selected as yet, it is not possible to provide numbers of beneficiaries at this level, however, if one estimates there are five staff or volunteers in each nominating CSO, a total of 30 Haitians will build their capacity in sustainable livelihoods and biodiversity conservation at this level. The fellows will support the work of these CSOs and/or at least one nature-based organisation in or around a priority KBA in Haiti.

In the long-term, the project will contribute to enhanced biodiversity conservation and sustainable livelihoods within local communities in and around the priority KBAs identified in Haiti. Improved management of these areas by resource managers and users and other community stakeholders can be expected.

The project focus on the generation and dissemination of creole language information projects will expand the beneficiary base to the wider Haitian and Creole-speaking Caribbean populace. These will include at least 200 stakeholders who will learn about tools and best practices on sustainable livelihoods/biodiversity conservation.

Q16. Exit Strategy

Project outputs that will further scaling out in Haiti and in the wider Creole-speaking Caribbean include the ICT products produced by the fellows described in the sections above. These will be narrated and/or captioned in Creole and shared widely by fellows, Haitian nominating organisations and CANARI. They will be shared by CANARI outside of Haiti to Caribbean countries such as Saint Lucia, Dominica, Guadeloupe and Martinique where Creole is spoken. They will also be shared within the CEPFII networks. Target audiences will include other CSOs as well as small business development Haitian Government agencies. The latter will be engaged in targeted virtual sessions with a view to institutionalising sustainable livelihood best practices within these institutions. CANARI will maintain contact with fellows and nominating organisations to share additional sustainable livelihood tools and resources that it develops.

Apart from the above, it is expected that the fellows will share their experiences and learnings with their nominating organisations. As early career professionals will be the target of the fellowship programme, it is anticipated that the fellows will carry their experiences with them to be applied to later career stages. It is also anticipated that fellows and Haitian

nominating organisations will maintain contact with CSOs and enterprises they engaged with in T&T (through CANARI or directly) for continued peer learning.

The potential applicants and grantees under CEPFII are likely to include Haitian organisations with a significant history of work in their respective KBAs and strong relationships with their respective communities. As such is anticipated that approaches and tools will be applied by the fellows and organisations beyond the life of this specific project.

CANARI emphasises participatory monitoring and evaluation (PM&E) in all its projects involving the project implementation team, stakeholders and partners. PM&E will be conducted at all stages of the project measured against the outputs and indicators highlighted in Q20 with stakeholders inputting at inception, midterm and end of project meetings. Baseline and final capacity assessments will be conducted for both fellows and their nominating organisations.

In terms of internal project management, CANARI has a robust monitoring system inclusive of monthly financial and narrative reports produced by project managers and financial officers, reviewed by CANARI's Programmes Director and discussed at monthly project management meetings. CANARI is continually refining and updating its tools and methodologies as it pertains to biodiversity conservation and sustainable livelihoods. As such we will be looking for the lessons learnt in replicating our tools and methodologies in Haiti, to further refine our practices. Our capacity building work has centred around mentoring programmes, online and in-person training, coaching and provision of small grants for on the ground action. We have also utilised peer-to-peer and action learning techniques in our work. This is our first attempt at a fellowship programme which is a capacity building avenue we wish to pursue more in the future. Our experiences in the execution of this initiative will therefore inform future fellowship programmes.

This initiative is heavily aligned to the CEPFII and takes advantages of gains and baseline information derived under that project. For instance, suitable sites (KBAs) have been identified. Grantees who will nominate fellows will have already been screened under CEPFII, thus providing significant cost savings. The use of the CEPF RIT Haiti Country Coordinator will provide other cost savings (matching funds) to support the fellowship nomination, screening and management of their activities when they are back in Haiti. The Darwin Initiative's complementary activities to the CEPFII will be noted and shared with CEPF administrators, donors and stakeholders, expanding the awareness of the Darwin Initiative funding programme.

The initiative builds on tools and resources produced under a number of CANARI past projects and current projects in T&T (see Q22) and will be used to give fellows practical experience. Furthermore, CANARI is a non-profit organisation which conducts project management and implementation in the most cost effective and efficient manner. Detailed budgets were prepared for each activity, specifying number of days required for each team member and hard costs. CANARI also undertakes careful financial planning and monitoring to ensure effectiveness and efficiency. Prior to any expenditure, estimates or quotations are obtained and the most cost-effective option selected, especially for flights and accommodation. CANARI's project manager approves all expenditure and the Financial Officer and Programmes Director provide oversight on financial management.
