The online Wetland Health and Vitality Course was translated into French and Portuguese and regionally relevant case studies were developed for both West Africa and Madagascar.

The West Africa course commenced in May 2025. 180 participants were recruited: 70% French, 18% English, and 12% Portuguese speakers. By September 2025, 73 participants (30% women) from 53 organisations across nine countries (Senegal, Mauritania, Guinea-Bissau, Cape Verde, Sierra Leone, Côte d'Ivoire, Benin, Guinea, and Nigeria) had completed the course. An extension of the course deadline has been granted to 12 participants who are currently still undertaking the course.

The Madagascar course launched in August 2025 with 69 participants. All applicants from Madagascar were accepted, given the limited target audience. 31 participants successfully completed the course by mid-October. An extension has been granted to all remaining participants with the aim of increasing completion rates. Despite outreach efforts, recruitment fell short due to the small national audience, and initial assumptions about the level of interest did not hold true. Nevertheless, we have already reached our overall target of training 150 conservationists across the three target regions.

In-person courses for West Africa and Madagascar were developed in collaboration with our partners, PRCM and WWT Madagascar. The in-person course for West Africa took place in the Saloum Delta in late September, attended by 23 participants. 8 participants were supported with additional IKI funding. The in-person course for Madagascar commenced on 20th October, with 12 participants in attendance. While the number was lower than anticipated, this was due to a combination of last-minute cancellations and a limited number of applications (and likely due to the political uncertainty currently prevailing in Madagascar).

Training for our partner organisations is currently underway. We launched a self-paced, online Training of Trainers Course in September 2025, attended by 8 staff members. Further training on fundraising capacity is being planned.

An online resource hub for wetland professionals hosted on the WLH website is currently being designed. We continue to have good engagement in our LinkedIn Alumni Group and a discussion forum specifically for female alumnae has been established on LinkedIn.

Our M&E systems have been established and remain appropriate for tracking participant engagement and course completion. This will be directly measured through pre- and post- course surveys in addition to monitoring workspaces and completion statistics on the learning platform.

Despite outreach efforts, recruitment fell slightly short for the Madagascar course due to the small national audience, and initial assumptions about the level of interest did not hold true. This experience highlights the challenges of meeting regional training targets in countries with smaller professional networks and limited access to Internet in more remote areas.

For future courses, setting more context-specific recruitment targets and investing in deeper stakeholder engagement early in the process may improve outcomes. Additionally, regional or multi-country approaches may be more effective than single-country models in contexts with limited national reach.
