The YUS Conservation Area is Papua New Guinea's first Conservation Area, spanning 162,683 hectares from the Saruwaget Range to the Bismarck Sea. The area provides protection for a broad range of endemic and endangered species, promotes sustainable management of natural resources by its 15,000 indigenous residents among 50 remote villages, and serves as a national model for the conservation of customary-owned land.

The YUS Conservation Area Management Committee (CAMC) is designed to facilitate direct engagement between customary landowners and all levels of government for the purpose of stakeholder accountability. However, a 2021 Management Effectiveness Assessment (METT) notes that the roles and responsibilities of each Committee member have not been fully understood or fulfilled. As a result, the Committee has been ineffective in facilitating stakeholder coordination in response to identified management priorities as defined by the area's customary landowners.

Additionally, as noted in a 2021 Social Impact Assessment (SAPA) the process for community/landowner representation in the protected area's governance and management is lacking, resulting in weakened community engagement in protected area management decision-making and limited opportunity to hold key government stakeholders accountable.

As a result, YUS communities have expressed frustration due to ineffective governance contributing to severe under-resourcing of essential public services including healthcare, education, and economic development. The SAPA Assessment report states that, "The development needs of the people are the responsibility of the government" and that "(the protected area's governance mechanisms) can assist the people to write their development agenda into the local planning mechanism."

The YUS Conservation Area's Ward (PNG's most localized level of government) Level Land Use Planning process is recognized by the 2021 METT Assessment as an effective participatory approach to community-based natural resource management, particularly within PNG's customary land tenure system. The process is designed to form the basis for each Ward's Development Plan and is intended to prompt support from government agencies at all levels through the YUS CAMC; comprised of representatives from the National, Provincial, District, and Local Level Governments, as well as landowners and the Tree Kangaroo Conservation Program (TKCP).

The 2021 METT scorecard notes that, while the tools and processes are conceptually in place to connect community priorities and government support, they are not functioning in accordance with their design. As a result, government services and support are misaligned with community priorities regarding conservation and development. Without such support, the communities' stated objectives and goals have often been unmet, which threatens to erode local support and participation in the management of the YUS Conservation Area and therefore its efficacy.

An effectively governed Conservation Area supports a healthy landscape and thriving communities. Improved capacities for local governance and community engagement in conservation and development planning will enhance the YUS Conservation Area's management effectiveness in maintaining the protected area's core natural, cultural, and socioeconomic values. As conservation policy and practice continues to develop in accordance with PNG's decentralized, customary land tenure context, the YUS Conservation Area serves as an excellent platform for developing and refining national best practices for community-based protected area management.

PNG's National Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan 2019-2024 responds to the effective management of natural resources throughout areas under customary land tenure (which comprises 97% of land across PNG), emphasizing the implementation of PNG's Protected Areas Policy (2014) and its associated Protected Areas Act (2024).

PNG's Protected Areas Policy is built upon five pillars:

- Protected area governance and management
- Sustainable livelihoods for communities
- Effective and adaptive biodiversity management
- Managing the protected area network
- Sustainable and equitable financing for protected areas

This project contributes toward Pillar 1, Objective 1.3: Ensure effective arrangements are in place for national, provincial, district and local level governments, communities including customary landowners, on-ground protected area managers and other partners to work in cooperation.

This project also contributes to implementation of PNG's recent National Sustainable Land Use Policy (NSLUP) which aims to ensure the conservation and sustainable use of land, natural resources, and environment for the collective benefit of current and future generations. The policy calls for integration of community-based land use planning into government development planning processes (which begin at the Ward level), through coordination between the Department of Lands and Physical Planning and the Department of Provincial and Local Level Government.

By strengthening the governance and management of the YUS Conservation Area, this project will support PNG's Nationally Determined Contributions by reducing deforestation, promoting forest conservation, and facilitating sustainable forest management. Through this project, the YUS Conservation Area's Management Committee will support community-based measures to protect forest ecosystems through its ward-level Land-use Planning activities—ensuring the protection of the YUS landscape, its biomass, and its capacity to serve as a net carbon sink.

As a result, this project's support for improved protected area governance, sustainable development and biodiversity conservation will contribute to PNG's international commitments towards the CBD and SDGs.

In response to the threat posed by ineffective governance throughout the YUS landscape (as identified via METT and SAPA assessments in 2021), TKCP, with support from IUCN's BIOPAMA Program in 2023-2024, launched the first phase of a multi-year 'Protected Area Governance and Accountability Initiative' to clarify and strengthen the YUS Conservation Area's governance structure. The initiative's primary objectives include improvements in community inclusion, participation, and representation in protected area management as well as increased government/stakeholder support and accountability for management actions.

With the resulting clarification and stakeholder consensus regarding the YUS Conservation Area's governance arrangements and core processes for adaptive management achieved through the first phase of this initiative, the next phase will focus on stakeholder capability and capacity in fulfilling their respective roles and responsibilities in maintaining the YUS Conservation Area's core natural, cultural, and socioeconomic values.

Key YUS Conservation Area stakeholders, including those represented on its Management Committee, require targeted, sustained training and guidance to effectively fulfil their respective roles and responsibilities as described in the forthcoming YUS Conservation Area Management Plan 2025-2034.

The project will target the YUS Conservation Area's 18 Ward Councilors, their respective Ward Development Committees, and the Local Level Government (LLG) structures under which they function. Recent (2024) stakeholder consultations have identified critical gaps in capacity and job knowledge among the area's Ward Councilors regarding:

- Formation and management of Ward Development Committees
- Facilitation of community engagement in planning processes
- Public administration, planning, and representation.

This project will contribute substantially to the YUS Conservation Area's Governance and Accountability Initiative through targeted, sustained training and practical skills development throughout the processes of integrated planning for - and adaptive management of - the protected area's actions and interventions.

Capacity-building efforts will also focus on Community Based Organizations (CBOs) throughout the YUS Conservation Area which serve to represent the interests of the area's customary landowner clans, and YUS Conservation Area staff including local Conservation Officers and community-based Rangers.

The project outcome will be achieved through an interdependent series of participatory capacity assessments, trainings, and collaborative workshops serving to:

1) Train, co-facilitate, and coach Ward Councilors and their Ward Development Committees throughout the Ward Development Planning process in accordance with national standards and best practices defined by the Department of Provincial and Local Government Affairs, and integrating established processes for Ward-level Land Use Planning. Participants will gain skills in public engagement, group facilitation, participatory planning, and persuasive presentation for the purpose of effective representation.

- 2) Train, coach, and enable CBO leaders throughout the YUS Conservation Area in mobilizing, representing, and advocating on behalf of their respective communities and customary landowners through active engagement in Ward and Local Level Government processes as well as YUS CAMC and stakeholder meetings. Activities will enhance leadership capability and capacity in participatory planning, group facilitation, conflict resolution, and persuasive speaking skills.
- 3) Train, co-facilitate, and guide YUS Conservation Area Management stakeholders including community leaders as well as ward, LLG, District, Provincial and National government representatives in fulfilling respective roles and responsibilities as contributing members of the YUS Conservation Area's recently-refined Management Framework. Members will benefit from improved capability and capacity to represent their respective agency's interests, identify and reference relevant plans, and report on progress according to respective commitments and responsibilities in support of the YUS Conservation Area's management objectives. These activities will correspond to, and reinforce, the capacity and capability of CBO leaders, Ward Councilors, and LLG representatives by serving as a platform for cooperation and application of core skills in leadership and representation.

By strengthening the capacity and capability of these local leaders and representatives throughout the YUS Conservation Area in support of integrated, participatory planning, this project will catalyse improved governance and management for the protected area. Effective conservation and development planning among YUS communities, facilitated by their Ward and LLG representatives, will result in greater alignment of government funding with the protected area's natural, cultural, and socioeconomic values according to locally-defined needs and priorities.

This approach will also garner national interest by PNG's Conservation and Environment Protection Authority, Department of Lands and Physical Planning, and the Department of Provincial and Local Government Affairs as it will serve as a practical example for the application of several recent legislative acts and policies supporting conservation and sustainable management of natural resources (Protected Areas Policy (2015), National Sustainable Land Use Policy (2022), Protected Areas Act (2024)) via empowerment of established government structure under PNG's Organic Law (1995) and Local Level Governments Administration Act (1997).

Q16. How will you identify participants?

How did/will you identify and select the participants (individuals and/or organisations) to directly benefit from the <u>capability and capacity building activities</u>? TKCP is currently facilitating a participatory, consultative process among YUS communities and stakeholders to refine the YUS Conservation Area's framework for governance and cooperative management. Through this process, participants include:

YUS Conservation Area Communities: Customary landowners and stewards of the YUS landscape and its natural resources, these communities are the primary rightsholders and beneficiaries of the protected area. Communities have reorganized into six 'zone-level' Community Based Organizations (CBO) and will nominate leaders/representatives for the area's 18 Wards via their respective CBO elections.

Ward Councilors: Elected officials representing the most localized level of government; responsible for Ward Development Planning and representation in public budgeting processes at the Local and District Levels.

Ward Development Committees: Established by Ward Councilors to facilitate community engagement and representation throughout the Ward Development Planning Process; each comprised of five appointed members including two men, two women, and the Ward Councilor as Chairperson.

Local Level Government (LLG) Presidents: Elected officials responsible for provision of acts, resources, and funding in accordance with community/Ward interests and development priorities.

District Development Authorities: Under guidance of the District's Member of Parliament and LLG Presidents, executive agency responsible for distribution of development funding and service delivery according to District Service Improvement Plans.

YUS Conservation Area Management Staff: Technical and operational staff responsible for facilitation of community-based land use planning, natural resource management, and monitoring of protected area targets and threats in support of adaptive management.

Participants are selected impartially, according to communities' election/nomination via CBOs and public election processes, with consideration for designated roles and responsibilities regarding government mandates and the YUS Conservation Area's governance framework. Throughout the project, TKCP will foster gender equity and social inclusion together with local communities through respective CBOs and Ward Development Committees to promote equitable participation and representation across all facets of conservation and development planning.

The principles of equity and inclusion are core and central to this project and to TKCP's wider YUS Conservation Area Governance and Accountability Initiative which seek to strengthen participation and representation throughout community planning and decision-making processes. Recognizing that cultures, traditions, and norms throughout the area are highly patriarchal with clan land ownership and leadership roles largely occupied by men, TKCP will actively engage and include the voices of women and other socially marginalized groups via established community structures including Mama Groups and local churches.

In particular, project activities supporting the formation and development of CBO structures and Ward Development Committees will strongly emphasize and facilitate establishment of diverse representation in accordance with local contexts and priorities for all community members. TKCP's facilitated discussions regarding land use and resource management in YUS utilize three-dimensional models (P3DM) constructed in 2019 through a participatory process with community members, designed to enable relatability and engagement among a broad range of social groups regardless of education level. Through this approach, women, youth, elders, and others are actively involved in the identification and discussion of various land uses, resource constraints, and recommendations as to their management.

This project's approach to Governance Capacity Building will utilize technical training methods and best practices designed to promote gender equality and social inclusion with consideration for local norms and customs. Through these methods, TKCP will ensure that the roles and perspectives of women and other marginalized groups are valued and incorporated into the area's governance structures guiding management of local conservation and development efforts throughout the YUS landscape.

By targeting the capacity and capability of customary landowners, leaders, and their local elected representatives throughout the YUS Conservation Area with regard to public administration and integrated planning for conservation and responsible development, this project will enhance the protected area's management effectiveness via increased government contribution and accountability. This project will equip the YUS Conservation Area's Ward and Local Level Governments with the knowledge and skills to create their respective Development Plans through a consultative, transparent process informed by a diverse range of community leaders, advocates, and representatives. By overcoming the persistent lack of such plans throughout much of the YUS Conservation Area, the Wards and LLGs will be well-equipped to secure and utilize appropriate government funding allocations to address key management priorities underpinning biodiversity conservation and socioeconomic well-being throughout the landscape.

This project will provide direct capability- and capacity-building support for 18 Ward Councilors and their respective Ward Development Committees (five members each), three LLG Presidents and their respective administration staff, as well as the leaders and directors of the YUS Conservation Area's five community-based organizations engaged in local conservation and natural resource management efforts. Ultimately, virtually all of the area's 15,000 residents (approximately 2,750 households) and customary landowners will indirectly benefit from the improved governance, public services, and support resulting from this project.

Q19. Sustainable benefits and scaling potential

How will the project reach a point where the benefits of strengthened capability and capacity can be sustained post-funding?

Sustainability: The YUS Conservation Area holds a great advantage in overcoming PNG's widespread challenges with weak local governance capacity as a result of the protected area's Management Committee structure and the unique opportunity for direct, regular engagement among the area's communities, customary landowners, and representatives from Local, District, Provincial, and National Government. By strengthening capacity and capability throughout the function of the protected area's core management processes, this project will bridge a critical divide between 1) needs, plans, and aspirations of the area's local/indigenous communities, and 2) government processes for provision of resources, funding, and services. The project will target, equip, and empower local stakeholders and representatives with the skills, tools, and practical experience throughout their integration into the YUS Conservation Area's management procedures, enabling their continued application and refinement into future planning cycles.

Scaling Potential: There is significant national interest in establishing and mainstreaming community-based land use planning as an integral component of PNG's system of bottom-up governance, as described in its recently launched National Sustainable Land Use Policy. The YUS Conservation Area is one of the country's best opportunities to put the policy into practice, as its 18 wards and communities already have 15 years of experience with the land use planning process. Through close coordination with the Department of Lands and Physical Planning and the Department of Provincial and Local Level Government, this project will generate valuable lessons to guide and inform the agencies' broader plans for implementing the policy throughout all of

PNG's 326 LLGs and over 6,100 Wards. Within Morobe Province, there is interest in pursuing protected area designation throughout the entire Saruwaget Mountain Range encompassing much of the Huon Peninsula. Lessons learned through this project will inform broader approaches to community-based planning and stakeholder engagement as these efforts progress over the next five years.

This project represents the second phase of TKCP's YUS Conservation Area Governance and Accountability Initiative, building upon an 18-month project (2023-2024) supported through IUCN's Biodiversity and Protected

Area Management (BIOPAMA) Program. The initiative is designed in response to findings and recommendations emerging from two Protected Area Management Assessments undertaken in 2021: Social Impact Assessment for Protected Areas (SAPA) and Management Effectiveness Tracking Tool (METT).

While the first phase of the initiative sought to engage stakeholders in reflection, review, refinement, and determination as to the protected area's structure and processes for equitable governance and inclusive management, the second phase will take those directives forward into practice together with the YUS Conservation Area Management Committee, subnational government representatives and their administrations, as well as YUS communities and customary landowners.

This project builds upon nearly three decades of TKCP's work in support of the establishment (achieved in 2009) and effective management of Papua New Guinea's first Conservation Area, and aligns directly with the YUS Conservation Area's forthcoming Management Plan 2025-2034.

The Tree Kangaroo Conservation Program is currently providing technical assistance to strengthen the YUS Conservation Area's systems and processes for monitoring and adaptive management of land and resource use, with funding under USAID's Lukautim Graun Program (2020-2026). TKCP is also supporting sustainable community livelihoods throughout the YUS Conservation Area, in partnership with the World Bank-funded PNG Coffee Industry Corporation's PNG Agriculture Commercialization and Diversification (PACD) project (2024-2025). This project will continue to build upon the governance-strengthening efforts launched in 2023 with support from IUCN's BIOPAMA Program (2023-2024), serving to complement ongoing interventions and improve the foundation for the YUS Conservation Area's cooperative management in response to local needs including sustainable resource management and community livelihoods. By building capacity and capability of local leaders and representatives in facilitating effective, integrated planning, this project will also enable increased communication and cooperation among other governmental and nongovernmental partners with a presence in the YUS landscape to promote effective collaboration in response to stated community priorities.

Darwin Initiative funding invested in this project will serve as a catalyst for improved governance and representation throughout the YUS Conservation Area – delivering impact by enabling improved services and livelihoods for more than 15,000 indigenous community members while strengthening stakeholder support of, and accountability for, their conservation and natural resource management efforts across the 162,000-hectare landscape.
