## **Darwin Regional Workshops**

### Current Approaches to understanding DI partnerships

#### Annual reports

- Largely indicator based
- Reluctance to report issues?

#### Final reports

- Largely indicator based
- Reluctance to report issues?

#### Mid-Term reviews

- Face-to-face discussions
- Mid-funding so some reluctance to report issues?

#### Evaluations of Closed Projects

- Face-to-face discussions
- For those no longer involved discussions very frank
- For those still involved there may be some reluctance to report issues

# African Perspective

Largely happy with UK partners **BUT** – Distinct reluctance to criticise UK partners - Issues with financial control of project contributions Support with 'matchmaking' sought

## America's Perspective

- Largely happy with UK partners BUT
  - Very much more vocal on issues
  - Find financial decision making very much a one-sided affair
  - Those working within new partnerships felt there was some inequality in decision making.





## Guidance Developed for Effective Partnerships

 Important to note this has been developed by the host country partners

- Published on the Darwin website in January 2010
- Hoped to be a resource for future Darwin collaborations

### **Pre-Application**

- 1. Establish a mutually beneficial collaboration;
- 2. Scoping visits are useful to cement relationships and project ideas;
- Problem identification should be driven by the host country;
- Roles and responsibilities of institutions involved should be clear, and balanced;
- 5. Roles and responsibilities of the individuals should be clear, and where possible, balanced;
- 6. Time taken to clarify the above should not be underestimated;

#### **Project Delivery**

- 7. An inception period is useful to revisit and adapt plans;
- 8. Adaptive Management is essential, particularly in those countries where Darwin projects operate;
- Milestone meetings are useful to review and evaluate progress towards project goals;
- 10. Capacity Building should be integral to project delivery.

## After the Darwin Initiative?

- 11. Post-projects there is an opportunity for role reversals
- 12. Fellowships can create a strong legacy

- Recognise there are challenges to working with partners in host countries
  - Cultural barriers
  - Language barriers
  - Finance barriers
  - Others?
- Measuring success in project partnerships allows us to understand the full effectiveness of the Darwin Initiative & Goal 11 of the 2010 targets
