Who are the DEC?



- A mix of experts from a broad range of fields relevant to the Darwin objectives
- Some lead their own projects
- Currently 20 individuals who review applications
- They have their own workload outside Darwin so be clear, provide all the information needed and make their reviews of your applications easier!

A strong log-frame!



- Clear, convincing impact statement
- SMART outcome indicators
- Measurable, specific impacts for biodiversity conservation and human livelihoods
- Assumptions that demonstrate an awareness of underlying uncertainties, etc.

A clear, convincing outcome



For example:

"Community land-care approach enables Bhutan's semi-nomadic herders and agencies to restore and protect high altitude rangelands, wildlife habitats and watersheds, and to improve livelihoods through sustainable livestock and forest management."

SMART outcome indicators



Examples of what a DEC reviewer might question:

- Species composition and richness of birds and mammals more similar to natural forest in areas with project interventions than in areas without project interventions. How will this be measured?
- Retaliatory killing of carnivores, particularly jaguars, reduced by 50% across project communities. What is the overall population trend? Are there other factors at work that might influence jaguar numbers?
- At least 200 Miskitu, Mayangna, and campesino families will experience a 50% increase in livestock productivity due to integrated livestock management. Over what period?

Measurable, specific impacts for biodiversity conservation and human livelihoods



Other questions the DEC may consider:

- What are the species / ecosystems that will benefit from the project?
- What is their current conservation status?
- What changes will the project bring about?
- What improvements will the project generate for the well-being of local people?
- What is their current status?
- How will changes be measured?

Assumptions demonstrating understanding of project context



- The security situation does not deteriorate
- Continued supportive relationship and close partnership with the relevant Ministry and government in general as appropriate
- Continued high level of local engagement
- Community able to keep records to support project work

Other factors



- · Good mix of partners, expertise and track record
- Does the application tell the whole story (within reason)
- Are there convincing link into international convention frameworks (i.e. beyond box-ticking)
- Is there a sound problem statement showing full understanding of the issues to be addressed
- Does the M&E plan align well with the log-frame
