What is the Darwin Initiative?



The Darwin Initiative was launched in 1992 at the Rio Earth Summit:

- to fund collaborative projects
- which use UK expertise
- to help countries rich in biodiversity but poor in resources to meet their commitments under the Convention of Biological Diversity (CBD), the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES); and the Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species (CMS)

Darwin Initiative: Facts and Figures



To date:

- £7 million budget per year
- Over £70million committed since its start
- Over 670 projects set up
- Projects run in over 140 countries
- Projects have involved over 200 UK institutions and a far greater number of overseas partner organisations.
- Funding to support 22 Scholars/Fellowships





Darwin Governance

Darwin Advisory Committee

Chaired by Professor David Macdonald and attended by 13 other experts in the field of biodiversity conservation. Also 3 Ex Officio representatives from JNCC, DFID and FCO.

LTS

Responsible for the Monitoring and Evaluation of Darwin projects, financial administration, project management support, applications and communications.

Darwin Secretariat

Responsible for overall strategy of Darwin Initiative, liaison with the DAC, overall management of LTS contract, organisation of Darwin lecture, press queries

Achievements Globally



Training

- 92 PhDs & 284 MSc qualifications
- 65,989 people receiving other forms of training
- 1,059 training materials developed for use by host countries.

Capacity Building

- 1,139 species and habitat management plans
- 197 permanent facilities or organisations established.
- £32 million leveraged for biodiversity conservation
